Shore Up Marin City	Marin City Urban Wetland Restoration – Community Visioning & Awareness Project	The project will conduct a robust community engagement and educational campaign for the planning and design of the Marin City Urban Wetland restoration project. The project will aim to recruit more community members into all remaining phases of the restoration process, including planning, public advocacy, community mobilization, volunteering, and supporting the efforts after project completion.	\$100,000	Planning	Application received in FY 2020-21. Governing Board approved funding for this project on April 16, 2021.
Literacy for Environmental Justice	Yosemite Slough Wetlands Stewardship Project	LEJ proposes a project to complete the restoration of the normative plant tidal ecosystem at Yosemite Slough and ensure stewardship of the entire site by the community. Key goals of the project include: Provide workforce development training in ecosystem restoration; propagate upper marsh native plants for outplanting at the site; remove trash and invasive plants from the site; engage community members and other volunteers to steward Yosemite Slough; etc.	\$100,000	Implementation	Application received in FY 2020-21. Governing Board approved funding for this project on October 15, 2021.
AYPAL: Building API Community Power	Bay API Youth Connected to Environment (BAYCE)	AYPAL (partnering with Asian Pacific Environmental Network and East Bay Regional Park District) will engage Asian and Pacific Islander (API) youth and other youth of color in Oakland and Richmond through outdoor educational workshops to educate young people on stewardship and caretaking of natural and green space. This project will also engage young people in direct restoration projects via shoreline and local park clean ups. Lastly, the project will bring youth on outdoor trips e.g. rafting and camping, where they can practice stewardship and learn outdoor skills.	\$100,000	Implementation	Application received in FY 2020-21. Project has not yet been brought to the Governing Board for funding authorization.
Planting Justice	Bay Restoration: Youth Engagement and Service Learning in East Oakland	The project includes 1) developing a curriculum for a series of ten training workshops for youth interns; 2) conducting the workshops using the curriculum to train approximately 20 youth interns in environmental justice issues and San Francisco Bay habitat restoration techniques; and 3) leading the interns in carrying out shoreline cleanup, invasive plant removal, and habitat restoration activities at the Martin Luther King Jr. Regional Shoreline in Alameda County.	\$99,713	Implementation	Application received in FY 2021-22. Governing Board approved funding for this project on February 25, 2022.
Brower Dellums Institute for Sustainable Policy Studies and Action (fiscal project of Social Good Fund)	The San Leandro (Lisjan) Creek Shoreline Community Project	The project will develop a Communications Hub - a network of agencies, community organizations, and residents involved in planning, constructing, and stewarding the San Leandro Creek Greenway Trail and surrounding shoreline habitat. Through the network, the Brower Dellums Institute will partner with other organizations to plant and maintain native vegetation, and engage community members in creating and sharing interpretive materials and signage detailing the natural history and cultural significance of the San Leandro Creek Greenway.	\$100,000	Planning; Implementation; Maintenance	Initial application received in FY 2021-22.
