SUBJECT:	San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority-Funded Projects with Community-Based Organization Partners and that Benefit Economically Disadvantaged Communities

Staff of the San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority (Authority) have been working in partnership with the Authority's Advisory Committee (AC) to develop Equity Guidelines and associated equity metrics that could be incorporated into the existing set of performance measures that are included in the Authority's annual reports. Currently, the primary equity performance measure is the percentage of projects that benefit an economically disadvantaged community (EDC). One of the options proposed for an additional equity performance measure was the amount of funding passed to community-based organizations (CBOs) through the regular grant round projects, to be calculated as they close out, as well as funding provided through the Community Grants Program.

As an initial step toward assessing this potential metric, Authority staff prepared the chart below showing the range of project types involving CBOs and benefiting EDCs. The chart shows regular grant round projects with CBO grantees and subcontractors, followed by projects funded through the Community Grant Program and regular grant round projects that benefit EDCs.
